Number of Cars sold in Australia in 2020

There were 916,968 cars sold in Australia during 2020. This was a 14% drop since 2019 making 2020 the lowest year for new car sales since 2003.

SUV's accounted for 49.6% of new car sales in 2020.

Also in 2020 Australians bought record numbers of CHINESE cars with 30,696 new Chinses cars being sold here. That's 3.35% of all sales with MG and LDV now inside the top 20 brands sold here.

China also became the 6th largest source of vehicles in 2020, behind Japan (309,601), Thailand (213,456), Korea (123,725), Germany (58,558), and the USA (33,731).

Deadline looms for new caravan quality laws

Not all RV builders and importers will make the July 2022 cut-off for tougher new compliance rules

The Australian Caravan Industry Association of Australia is urging all RV manufacturers and importers to get up to speed with tough new compliance laws that come into force next year.

Last week the peak industry body encouraged manufacturers and importers to attend a special webinar run by the Federal Department of Transport that covered the various changes in the new Road Vehicle Standards (RVS) legislation that apply to all trailers with an aggregate trailer mass (ATM) of 4500kg or less.

What does it all mean?

The good news for consumers is that the caravan or camper trailer you buy in Australia after 30 June next year will probably have met a new design and manufacturing standard ensuring it has been built properly and is fit for its intended purpose.

But with just over six months to go, time is running out for many local manufacturers to get this approval, meaning that stocks of compliant vehicles may be delayed, or reduced.

Travel restrictions for fruit and vegetables in South Australia.

Law changes 29/7/2021

South Australia has restrictions on what fruit, vegetables, plants and plant products can be brought into the state and Riverland. Refer to this web site for full details:-

Travel restrictions for fruit and vegetables in South Australia - PIRSA (fruitfly.sa.gov.au)

Plan your travel to avoid a fine. You cannot bring certain fruit and vegetables into the Riverland

Fruit and vegetables that are at risk from fruit fly cannot travel with you into the Riverland. To protect Riverland growers the 'bring a receipt' rule is no longer recognised.

You will be fined if you are caught travelling into the Riverland with <u>these fruit and vegetables</u>. **The law changed on 29 July 2021.**

Common restricted fruit and vegetables

Apples, apricot, avocado, banana, blackberry, blueberry, capsicum, cherry, chilli, cumquat, dates, eggplant, fig, grapefruit, kiwifruit, lemon, lime, mandarin, mango, mulberry, nectarine, olives, oranges, papaya, passionfriut, pawpaw, peach, pear, plum, pomegranate, quince, raspberry, tomato and strawberries.

Restricted preparation of these fruit and vegetables

You <u>cannot</u> prepare restricted fruit and vegetables in these ways as they are still at risk from fruit fly. <u>Mashed, sliced or chopped up</u>.

Preparing restricted fruit and vegetables so they can move around

All fruit and vegetables, including those restricted can be prepared in the following ways. Canned, cooked, dried, frozen, grated or pureed.

Common fruit and vegetables without restrictions Fruits

These fruits are not affected by restrictions.

Honeydew, Pineapple, rockmelon and watermelon.

Vegetables

These vegetables are not affected by restrictions.

Artichoke, asparagus, beans, beetroot, broccoli, cabbage, carrot, celery, corn, cucumber, kale, leafy and Asian greens, leek, lettuce, mushroom, onion, parsnip, potato, pumpkin, peas and snow peas, spinach, squash and zucchini.

And God looked down and saw that it was good.



Using the entry and exit points shown on the above map in RED, I was informed that a CLASS A vehicle would cost \$21.06 while a CLASS B vehicle would cost a staggering \$63.18 for a 53.12 kilometre one way trip.

So what exactly is a CLASS A and CLASS B vehicle.


Basically a CLASS A is a vehicle that is 12.5 metres or less in length and either a 3-axel vehicle under 2.0 metres, or a 2-axel vehicle under 2.8 metres in height.

Basically everything else is a CLASS B vehicle.

So most caravans would be longer than 12.5 metres and most non pop top caravans over 2.8 metres high = CLASS B......
