

Caravan rally 'great for town'

KERANG Holiday Park hosted a group of 80 guests in 50 caravans from the Association of Caravan Clubs of Victoria last weekend.

The group stages an annual state rally at one location where representatives from clubs from across the state gather and socialise and organise events for the coming calendar year.

Tony and Dee Height were their hosts.

They took over the caravan park, on the southern approach to Kerang, 18 months ago and are originally from Melbourne.

Mr Height said the growth in Kerang and its surrounds was a big motivator in taking on the business.

"Since we have arrived, we are working to make improvements to the park and making it a great place for visitors and friends and family of local people to come and stay," Mr Height said.

"The rally coming to town is great for the town and great for tourism.

"We are trying to promote local businesses and attractions like Shepo's Whey, the bowling club, the lakes and the nature that is available here in Kerang and the surrounds".

Dee Height said the group had been enjoying the events that the park had organised for them.

"Each one of the group will go back and talk to their clubs and, hopefully, will say this town is great ,we should go back there with their own clubs," Ms Height said.

"We are aiming to promote the town and hopefully there will be more clubs coming to our town.

"Many of them bring bikes to explore the towns they visit, we don't have a track from our site as yet, however, we are working with the Gannawarra Shire about putting something in place in the near future."

State rally co-ordinator Stella Breese said she loves the area and, in particular, the weather.

"We like to choose places that are a little smaller rather than bigger ones, it's great to support them," Ms Breese said.

ACCVIC state president Alan Andrews said there were 10 caravan clubs represented at the weekend.

"The area has lots of tourism appeal," Mr Andrews said.

"You have Lake Boga close by with the Catalinas and, of course, Swan Hill, that is steeped in history."

Hijacking Wireless Keys

One of the high-tech features of our modern cars is the use of keyless entry and remote start. The key fob you have is paired to your car using a code that both your car and fob know, which prevents you from starting other cars. The difference between keyless entry and the remotes that unlock your car is that keyless entry fobs are <u>always</u> transmitting, so when you get near your car and touch the door, it will unlock.

That word "always" is very important because thieves quickly realized they can eavesdrop on the radio signal and make a recording. They could then "replay" the recording and unlock your car. To help with security, the newest fobs use a one-time code to open the door.

The network used by all computers in a car to communicate is called a controller area network (CAN) bus. It's designed to allow the computers in a car to send commands and information to each other. The CAN bus was <u>not</u> designed for <u>security</u>, because all of the devices are assumed to be self-contained. But that presumption leaves the CAN bus vulnerable to hackers.

Car thieves often try to hack into the CAN bus and from there the computers that control the car's engine. The engine control unit stores a copy of the wireless key code, and thieves can clone this to a blank key fob to use to start the victim's car. One method is accessing a car's onboard diagnosis through a physical port or wireless connection meant for repair technicians. Thieves who access the onboard diagnostics gain access to the CAN bus.



This image was taken from a YouTube video and shows how the car was stolen in a matter of seconds.

There are two people involved. First the guy in the red hoody is standing close to where your key is stored.

He is holding a device that is receiving the signal from your electronic car key. Once received it is then transmitted to the car and bingo your car is open and can be started. Most modern car key fobs have a range of around 10 to 15 meters, but some may have longer ranges.

This scenario can also work if you are in your caravan and your 4WD is close by......

Years ago there was lots of talk about thieves stealing your credit card details using similar card reading gadgets and then placing that information onto a blank card. The way around that was to use wallets and purses that had metal built into the outside lining.

Like the wallets and purses mentioned above you can now purchase containers (the box on the right) and key fobs (on the far right) that will block the signal sent from your car key fob, thus thwarting thieves.

Taxable Income

A question was raised at the last "Delegates Zoom meeting" about a contribution/donation of \$3,000.00 so that the Caravan Club could buy a defibrillator. Here is the long winded answer with the short answer at the bottom.

Summary from the ATO web site

For a 'contribution or donation' of for example 'money to buy a defibrillator for your Caravan Club' to be tax-deductible to the contributor then your Caravan Club must be a DGR – A deductible gift recipient. As ACCVic and all the Caravan Clubs being members of ACCVic are NOT charitable organizations then ACCVic and all the Caravan Clubs being members of ACCVic then cannot be a DRG.

Therefore, a contribution or donation is NOT classed as taxable income.

<u>PS — The Income Tax Guide for Not For Profit Organisations is 112 pages long.</u>

PSS — Member annual membership fees ARE NOT classed as taxable income.

<u>The ATO has determined that all members of ACCVic—that's your Caravan Club— are classed as taxable.</u>

However if your Caravan Club does not have an active ABN AND your taxable income is less that \$416.00 then you DO NOT NEED TO LODGE AN ANNUAL TAX RETURN.

ACCVic has an active ABN and earned taxable income from its Term Deposit of \$883.00.

The first \$416.00 of this is tax free with that portion over \$417.00 being taxed at 55%.

So $466.00 \times 55\% = 256.30$ (This is my estimate of the tax payable by ACCVic).

If our taxable income was over \$1,000.00 then the tax rate is 30% on the whole amount.

Cards etc found in my wallet

Prior to any extended travel, such as three months in Queensland this winter, I photo copy the front and back of all valuable documents in my wallet.

Should I lose my wallet or have it stole I can then go to the copy and contact my Bank etc and advise them of the cards loss.

Such a simple thing to do.



What the caravanners said was that the caravan jumped off the tow ball while they were travelling at 95 KPH.

Ball couplings are by far the most common form of hitch used to connect trailers to their tow vehicles, and everyone using a trailer would be familiar with the very basic routine of hitching up their trailer with such a piece of equipment. But it is not always understood how such couplings should be adjusted to suit the ball, and the simple need to occasionally check that coupling's adjustment. See the image below.

As the ball coupling wears you will also have to adjust to accommodate that wear. The loss of the chrome coating off the ball will require an adjustment.

It is for these reasons that it is highly recommended that the couplings and balls have a coating of grease or similar lubricant, to reduce that wear. The process is quite simple and requires only a 21mm ring spanner and a good flat blade screwdriver.

Adjusting the Ball Adjustment Screw on an AL-KO Coupling

In order to adjust the ball adjustment screw, the coupling must be first fitted to the tow ball.

The 21mm locking nut should first be loosened by turning anticlockwise.

Using a large 'flat head' screwdriver, the adjustment screw should then be turned clockwise until contact is made with the ball. Only very light contact should be made otherwise premature wear may occur.

Tighten the locking nut to ensure the adjustment of the screw does not change.

Note: The adjuster screw on an AL-KO tow ball coupling is designed to minimise the design clearance of the tow ball within the coupling socket. The adjuster is not designed to compensate for a tow ball that is under size. Careful attention should be paid to the ball size in the case of excessive wear.

Association of Caravan Clubs Victoria Web site

Access to other general caravan club members is generally not given.
