Avoiding membership dramas is only achieved by getting people to join your club.

Some suggestions: talk to other caravanners at club rallies about club membership; invite any of your caravanning friends to come along; have an "About Us" flyer; maybe a "You've been spotted" flyer; publish illustrated reports of rallies and membership drives in the local newspaper or caravanning magazines; ask friendly caravan retail outlets to promote your club by handing out your "Application to Join" or "About Us" forms, and so on. It is all about making others aware of your club and how you can enhance their caravanning experience.

Also, members need to be committed to supporting their club. In my view, having a working set of volunteers in committee of management positions indicates that, as does attending club rallies as often as possible. Of course, there will always be "the willing few", but they may appreciate a break from duties at some point. Others need to fill the gap gaining experience in whatever position becomes available.

And then, for an incorporated club, and despite all efforts, if numbers fall away to the point where it is no longer viable and has no alternative but to fold, there are government directives as outlined on the Consumer Affairs website to be followed. This scenario to be avoided at all costs despite members migrating to other clubs to keep their caravanning experience going.

# Bigpond closing this year

There are thousands of rumors on the internet about Bigpond.com being closed this year.

WITH the closure of TPG email in September 2023, many of their customers were left scrambling to find an alternative email provider and make the swap. Others have stayed with TPG and will have a year of free service provided by The Messaging Company, who TPG have contracted to take over the service. It's unclear what the cost will be for users once the year is up. TPG's email service included legacy iiNet and OzEmail accounts.

People who use Telstra's Bigpond or Optus' mail services are at risk of receiving a similar announcement. Telstra has been slowly phasing out Bigpond since 2013, and there have been periodic reports of an upcoming closure since 2016. There has been no recent news on this front, but it seems quite likely at this point, particularly now that TPG have provided a roadmap for the process.

After reading these stories I decided to visit a local Bendigo suburb Telstra Shop. The office girl was adamant that Telstra having just spent millions of Bigpond.com was not going to close.

Then one of my friends went into a Telstra shop in Warragul and was told the opposite, that Bigpond.com was definitely closing.

Here are some popular free email providers:-

Gmail which is ran by Google

Outlook run by Microsoft and there would be a cost if you are not a Microsoft Office subscriber

Yahoo Mail ran by Yahoo

Lets say Bigpond.com did close. What a mess it would make. Lets start with all of your direct debits. What about the "third level of security" that sends a number to your email address that you must use to log into your bank etc etc etc.....

What about your dividend statements that are now sent to Bigpond?

### How do you calculate underinsurance According to the Insurance industry

According to the Insurance Council of Australia, 23 per cent Australian homeowners - or 1.8 million households - don't have enough insurance to cover the true value of their home and contents should disaster strike.

This example shows that if a home has a rebuild cost of \$600,000.00 but is only insured for \$450,000.00, i.e., only 75% insured, that means that it is 25% underinsured.

If there is a partial damage claim to the house for \$40,000.00, then only 75% will be paid out for the claim which equals \$30,000.00.

Meaning that YOU pay the other \$10,000.00. (A claim for all \$600,000.00 means you pay \$150,000.00)

Whereas over insurance is when the property and/or contents are insured in excess of the value of the property or contents. Meaning that you are paying higher than necessary insurance premiums.

RACV has a calculator for estimating the rebuild cost of your home :-

When I overestimated a few items it says that the rebuild cost would be \$1,080,000.00.

Our double story house in sunny Bendigo is valued at \$700,000.00 and I have the property insured for \$800,000.00. Remember when your house in burnt down you also need to cover the cost or removal of all debris including the old concrete slab. An internet search says the removal cost of such debris could be anywhere between \$12,000.00 and \$40,000.00.

Please review your insurance policies regularly and make sure you are not underinsured.


# JCB & Hydrogen Engines

I have just finished watching a YouTube video - https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=H6\_qAta3Gk8 about JCB's aim to make its heavy machinery work on hydrogen power.

JCB has set up a factory in India as India imports all of its oil and gas but like Australia it has plenty of sunshine. There are numerous ways to make hydrogen but a recent change in the USA requires that hydrogen be made from GREEN SOURCES to claim any tax benefits.

### **Electrolysis of water:-**

Water electrolysis is using electricity to split water into hydrogen and oxygen. As of 2020, less than 0.1% of hydrogen production comes from water electrolysis. That should change rapidly considering the abovementioned US law change. Electrolysis of water is 70–80% efficient.



The process would look like this. Electricity produced by solar of wind farms is used to separate water (H2O) into its two gases being hydrogen and oxygen. Both of these gases have industrial uses.

JCB started off with its normal diesel engine and then modified it to run on hydrogen. The biggest change I save in the video was the use of spark plugs.

The JCB Chairman Lord Bamford said that "Fossil fuels are not the future. Developed from first principles, the JCB hydrogen engine has been designed to optimise the combustion of hydrogen, so that it can deliver the <u>same power</u>, the <u>same torque</u>, and the <u>same efficiency</u> that powers JCB machines today, but in a zero-carbon way."

Prototype JCB hydrogen engines are already powering backhoe loader and Loadall telescopic handler machines under test conditions in the UK.



JCB India's CEO and Managing Director added that "Visitors to EXCON, the Indian Trade Show, will see Asia's first construction machine, powered by a hydrogen combustion engine. We are witnessing the beginning of an exciting zero-carbon future in India's earthmoving sector, and hydrogen combustion will be at the heart of that future." At the moment filling up your JCB machine is easy because JCB has its own fuel tankers that come to you. I presume that they are thinking that there will be numerous JCB vehicles at each work site so that the refueling vehicle can fill each vehicle quickly (just the same as putting gas/diesel in your vehicle) meaning that they are not required to leave the work area.
