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Presidents Report

Delegate and Committee meetings this year have all been held via Zoom and may continue to be. Attendance has been pleasing as members become more familiar with the technology. It certainly is convenient and successful if good internet connectivity is available to participating members.

However, there will be occasions when a face-to-face meeting is necessary.

The eight months since our March meeting presented several challenges for Committee. Importantly, the *Australian Taxation Office* (ATO) is changing the taxation obligation for Not-for-profit incorporated associations with Australian Business Numbers. Apparently, there are some associations acting openly as businesses and not paying tax as the ATO declares they should. A sub-committee has forwarded a Private Ruling request to the ATO asking what section we fit into (possible a community-based organisation) and if we should be paying tax. The ATO indicated it would take 50 days to respond. A reply is not expected until late December 2023.

Obtaining Public Liability Insurance for all our affiliated associations was again nerve racking this year despite assurances from NACC Secretary Rin Klasen that all would be well. There was universal relief when, in July, the actual Certificates of Currency became available. We all look forward to a much smoother run next year. Our confidence in Rin Klasen proved to be well founded and I take this opportunity to publicly thank him for his continued effort in this regard.

This year's State Rally at Horsham in March was a resounding success. State Rally Coordinator Stella Breese again excelled in organising a superb weekend. The weather was fine, the company most jovial, the excursions enjoyable and informative. I for one had no idea the "Stick Shed" existed. There is a full report about the weekend in a Newsletter. High Court rejects Victoria tax on EVs-October 2023

The High Court has rejected the Victorian government's tax on electric vehicles as invalid, ruling that only the Commonwealth has the power to make such laws. The court ruled by a 4-3 majority that the Zero and Low Emission Vehicle (ZLEV) Distance-based Charge Act 2021 was an "inland tax on goods" that fitted the definition of an excise under section 90 of the constitution.

The case was brought by two EV car owners, nursing manager Chris Vanderstock and engineering consultant Kath Davies, who have called the Act "the world's worst EV policy" and "a roadblock to reducing emissions" and getting better air quality.

The Act required the two owners to provide an odometer reading 14 days after it began on July 1, 2021. The charge was 2.8¢ a kilometer on specified roads for an electric vehicle (which Mr Vanderstock owned) and 2.3¢ for a plug-in hybrid electric vehicle (as owned by Ms Davies).

The tax affects about 15,000 Victorian EV car owners and has been closely watched for its impact on how EVs are taxed and what level of government can collect revenue from their use.

Victoria and the other states argued that it was a tax on an activity and therefore did not come within section 90. If they had succeeded, it would have given the green light for other states to implement similar legislation to ensure all vehicle owners contributed to road construction and maintenance.

An internet search says that there are 5,157,172 vehicles registered in Victoria as of 2021. That means that over 5,140,000 Victoria drivers pay \$0.488 per liter for petrol and diesel excise duty. An internet search states that Australian motorists typically drive 15,500 kilometers each year.

Doing the math's mean that if you drive a petrol or diesel vehicle that does an average 10 liters per 100 kilometers then you need to buy 1,550 liters of fuel pa. Therefore $1,550 \times 0.488 = \text{approximately}$ \$750.00 per annum in fuel excise duty which goes towards our roads. How's your local roads!

BUT if you own an Electric Vehicle in Victoria you pay NOTHING towards the cost of the roads that YOU DRIVE ON.

They were charged 2.8 cents per kilometer travelled during the year. If they travelled the average 15,500 kilometers per year then they would pay \$434.00 per annum. That's \$316.00 per annum less than what a normal petrol/diesel driver would pay.

They apparently 'crowd funded' \$50,000.00 to help pay their legal fees just to save \$434.00 per annum.

Perhaps it is now time to approach your local Politian to get this fixed so that Electric vehicles pay their fair share of road maintenance.

I recently emailed my local MP, Maree Edwards asking/insisting that she contact the Federal Government and request them to legislate an Excise Tax on EV's similar or higher then the illegal Victorian Tax.

She replied saying that she had forwarded my request to the Treasurer,

Mount Panorama Bathurst

This world class race track is 6.213 kilometers around. The race covers 161 laps or 1,000.29 kilometers. The top speed reached by the winner Shane van Gisbergen was 300.5 kilometers per hour.

In 2023 every lap required approximately 5.5 liters of fuel. That's about 1.13 Liters Per Kilometer.

The steepest grade is 1 in 6.13. That means that for every 10 meters forward you rise 61.3 meters.

Unfortunately there was one part that regularly appeared when a car slowed down and pulled into the pits, and that was a gear shift assembly which sits next to the driver. The gear box on these cars is actually attached to the rear differential. The gear shift assembly sits next to the driver with a rod going from this assembly to the gear box to change gears. A lot of the noise you hear from the car is actually the straight cut gears in the gear box. These gear boxes are sequential just like a motor bike. The rear differential is 'locked' not like a limited slip differential in your car.



This sequential gear selector, on the left near the drivers fingers, is bolted/screwed to the car floor and appeared to come away fairly easily, at least for a few unlucky drivers.

You and I can go to our local service station and buy E10 which is a mixture of unleaded fuel (90%) and ethanol (10%). However these Supercars run on E85 made up of 85 percent ethanol and 15 percent BP Ultimate unleaded petrol.

Ah, the wind in your hair, the open road ahead, and not a care in the world... except all the trackers, cameras, microphones, and sensors capturing your every move. Modern cars are a **privacy nightmare**.

Car makers have been bragging about their cars being "computers on wheels" for years to promote their advanced features. However, the conversation about what driving a computer means for its occupants' privacy hasn't really caught up. While we worried about connect to the internet etc, car brands quietly entered the data business by turning their vehicles into powerful data-gobbling machines. Machines that, because of all those brag-worthy bells and whistles, have an unmatched power to watch, listen, and collect information about what you do and where you go in your car.

1. They collect too much personal data (all of them)

We reviewed 25 car brands in our research and they all collect and use data and personal information. That's right: *every car brand* we looked at collects more personal data than necessary and uses that information for a reason other than to operate your vehicle and manage their relationship with you.

And car companies have so many more data-collecting opportunities than other products and apps we use, more than even smart devices in our homes or the cell phones we take wherever we go.

They can collect personal information from how you interact with your car, the connected services you use in your car, the car's app (which provides a gateway to information on your phone), and can gather even more information about you from third party sources like Sirius XM or Google Maps. The ways that car companies collect and share your data are so vast and complicated that we wrote an entire piece on how that works. The gist is: they can collect super intimate information about you -- from your medical information, your genetic information, to your "sex life" (seriously), to how fast you drive, where you drive, and what songs you play in your car. They then use it to invent more data about you through "inferences" about things like your intelligence, abilities, and interests.

2. Most (84%) share or sell your data

It's bad enough for the behemoth corporations that own the car brands to have all that personal information in their possession, to use for their own research, marketing, or the ultra-vague "business purposes." But then, most (84%) of the car brands we researched say they can share your personal data, with service providers, data brokers, and other businesses we know little or nothing about. Worse, nineteen (76%) say they can sell your personal data.

A surprising number (56%) also say they can share your information with the government or law enforcement in response to a "request." Not a high court order, but something as easy as an "informal request."

And keep in mind that we only know what companies do with personal data because of the privacy laws that make it illegal not to disclose that information. So-called anonymized and aggregated data can (and probably is) shared too, with vehicle data hubs (the data brokers of the auto industry) and others.

3. Most (92%) give drivers little to no control over their personal data

All but two of the 25 car brands we reviewed earned our "ding" for data control, meaning only two car brands, Renault and Dacia (owned by the same parent company) say that all drivers have the right to have their personal data deleted. We would like to think this deviation is one car company taking a stand for drivers' privacy.

Victorian Road Budget

The following are various quotes that I have taken from the internet after doing a search for Vic Roads funding.

In the 2020 — 21 Victorian Budget the Road Asset Management budget was \$823.00 million.

In the 2022 — 23 Victorian Budget the Road Asset Management budget was \$592.7 million.

That's a drop of \$230.7 million. That's \$10.4 million every working day, assuming five working days per week.

In an announcement made on the 13th of June 2023 "The Road Safety Fund which receives money from the TAC was reduced \$126 million this financial year and will be cut a further \$48 million next year". The Government could not explain why.

Shadow Minister for Roads and Road Safety, Danny O'Brien, said a 45 per cent cut to the roads maintenance budget since 2020, including a further 25 per cent cut in this year's budget was hurting Victorian motorists.

What is the threshold for VicRoads claims?

This section assumes that your vehicle has suffered damage from a pothole etc.

The threshold amount, which is valued at \$1,580.00 for the 2023/24 financial year, is indexed annually in accordance with the Consumer Price Index. Where Vic Roads is liable to pay you compensation for property damage, the payment is reduced by the threshold amount.

For example if my Motorhome passenger side tyres and rims were damaged and needed replacement the cost may be \$120.00 per rim, plus \$300.00 per tyre. That's a total of \$840.00. If you then add another \$280.00 for two new shock absorbers the total climbs to \$1,120.00.

The best I could find about towing rates was this:-

Base fee \$227.50 which includes the first 8 kilometres

Plus \$3.60 per kilometer beyond 8 kilometeres

Lets forget about the after hours surcharge of \$77.60.

If you need to be towed for say 108 kilometers (for simplicity) then the cost would be \$587.50.

Add this to our total of \$1,120.00 and you get \$1,707.50.

If you then deduct the Vic Roads threshold of \$1,580.00 then Vic Roads will pay you the grand total of \$127.50.

Notice I have not included any labour.
